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From the Con Chair (Our North Star)

I don't remember which was my first Capricon. A lot of people on the concom (convention committee) do, though – long-timers will proudly declare the number of their first Capricon, but I didn't take much note of it at the time. I was still overwhelmed by the "con scene" and didn't understand the decades of tradition and culture I was dipping my toe into. I just knew that cons like Capricon were places where I could listen to smart people talk about nerdy things, sell my work as a brighteyed, bushy-tailed hopeful artist, and have fun with friends at parties (oh, the parties!).

The oldest program book I have in my personal archives seems to be from Capricon 29, though, for what it's worth. That one was run by Helen Montgomery, who I've long looked up to in the years since. And, paging through that program book, I see a lot of other names I now know, many of whom have become friends... and sadly, some who have passed.

I do remember that the first Capricon I ever worked concom for was Capricon 32, though. Previously, I had tipsily inquired of Kerry Kuhn, the art show lead at WindyCon, how one gets into running art shows, and she got the now-familiar gleam in her eye of a conrunner sensing a fresh volunteer. Once I learned the ropes as her second, I was recruited by Sondra de Jong to be the art show lead at Capricon. And then I spent over a decade doing that, making friends among the convention art community and driving our poor IT lead up the walls (seriously, Chris Dundon, you are a bona fide saint).

Along the way, I recruited other friends and brought them into the conrunning fold (sorry not sorry) until every Capricon, no matter how busy my life is, has felt like a joyous reunion and celebration. This convention has become one of the brightest stars in the constellation of my life, something that helps me orient myself when times get rough – and good heavens, have times been rough for us all lately!

Because of recent difficulties, Capricon has had to change and adapt, just as all fan-run conventions must change and adapt over time to endure. And so, when I was considering what this year's theme would be, I envisioned an adventurer – doesn't matter what genre they're from – looking up at the night sky and seeing the stars overhead.

Stars provide hope, guidance, and a sense of continuity, for all that they wheel and spin around us and constellations slowly creep into new configurations. Stars give an anchor to orbits, provide essential guides to navigators, and bring light and life to the universe. Stars endure in ways that we do not – and even long-dead stars endure in us. As Delenn said on Babylon 5: "We are starstuff. We are the universe made manifest, trying to figure itself out."

This year, we celebrate The Endurance of Stars, and the ability of the speculative fiction genres to spark our imaginations, allow us to reflect on our journeys and explore ourselves, and to show us a way forward even in the darkest of nights.

Whether this is your first Capricon or your forty-fourth, I hope you join me in looking up – and looking forward – to what this event and community has in store for us next. Thank you all for sharing this adventure with me.

Safety Policy for COVID-19

Due to outbreaks at other conventions & events, and upon recommendation from the head of the CDC*, Capricon will maintain a **Mandatory Masking Policy** for all members (both staff and attendees) in all convention spaces unless actively eating or drinking. This means that the ConSuite will be considered a high risk area, and will have signage indicating such. Convention-affiliated parties may choose to require masking or not, and signage at their doors will indicate their preference; parties not requiring masks will likewise be considered high risk areas.

However, we will no longer be requiring proof of current vaccination at registration. We encourage all members to update their vaccinations prior to the convention regardless, not just for COVID-19 but for other seasonal illnesses as well.

We strongly recommend that all members test themselves for COVID-19 just prior to coming to the convention. Free COVID-19 test kits are available at https://faq.usps.com/s/article/At-Home-COVID-19-Test-Kits. If you test positive for COVID-19 before the convention, please stay home - we will offer rollover badges to those unable to come to the convention due to COVID-19. We also request that anyone feeling ill, experiencing new symptoms, or testing positive for COVID-19 / Flu / RSV during the convention quarantine in their hotel sleeping room or go home.

If you think/know you have contracted COVID-19, please contact us at covid@Capricon.org (during Capricon or within 2 weeks afterwards) with details of which spaces you've been in, so that we can track potential hotspots. Any information we share with the membership at large will be anonymized as best as we are able.

If you have already purchased your badge and have medical reasons that mean this policy will prevent you from attending Capricon 44, please contact <u>chair@Capricon.org</u> for further information.

Phandemonium Code of Conduct

Phandemonium, (Capricon's parent organization) Capricon, and various affiliated outreach events exist for the enjoyment and enrichment of the fannish community. To ensure that the greatest number of people achieve this objective, we have established this Code of Conduct. By this Code, we seek only to ensure that the behavior of any individual or group does not disturb the membership as a whole, nor does it detract from the overall enjoyment of our events.

It is important that you read and understand this Code. Anyone who attends a Phandemonium event, including Capricon, is expected to follow this Code for the entire duration of the event, including any informal pre- or post-event activities.

Phandemonium reserves the right to amend these rules at any time without prior or posted notice and reserves the sole right of interpretation. Please keep in mind that these rules are put in place to ensure the safety and comfort of our attendees. They are not all-inclusive. In all cases, the singular rule that supersedes all others is, "Any action or behavior that is illegal or causes significant interference with event operations, excessive discomfort to other attendees, or adversely affects Phandemonium's relationship with its guests, its venue, or the public is strictly forbidden and may result in revocation of membership privileges."

Although we anticipate no difficulties, Phandemonium is prepared to deal with any issues related to the Code in as rapid and efficient a manner as possible should they occur. We thank our members and attendees for their past cooperation and for their continued assistance in making Phandemonium events enjoyable experiences for everyone. Have fun and please remember to be courteous of those around you while doing so!

All Phandemonium events may have additional policies that members / attendees are required to follow. Any additional policies for events will be posted on the official Capricon website and social media.

I. Respect for Others

Phandemonium wants all its attendees to enjoy themselves at its events. As such, we ask that you respect each other. All Phandemonium events should be a space where everyone feels welcomed and comfortable. Phandemonium forbids abusive, insulting, harassing, and / or intimidating behavior which includes, but is not limited to, stalking, physical or verbal intimidation, discriminatory comments, inappropriate physical contact, hate group iconography and unwelcome sexual attention.

Consent: Only "yes" means yes. If a person does not express clear consent for attention or personal intervention, then consent has not been given.

Discrimination (based on, but not limited to, gender, race, ethnicity, religion, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, or physical / mental disability) is not tolerated.

Harassment of any kind is not tolerated. It includes but is not limited to:

- offensive verbal comments about gender, gender identity and expression, sexuality, sexual orientation, disability or impairment, physical appearance, body size, race/ethnicity, age or religion
- intimidation, stalking or following
- photographing or recording someone without their permission
- sustained disruption of talks or other events
- uninvited physical contact
- uninvited sexual attention
- bathroom policing

Participants asked to stop behavior that is perceived as harassing must comply immediately.

Racism of any kind will not be tolerated. At Phandemonium, we want to welcome the voices of people who are often spoken over or erased in Fandom - and make Phandemonium events as inclusive as we can to people from all racial and ethnic backgrounds.

Phandemonium Code of Conduct

Iconography & Sexualized Imagery/Discussion:

As we strive to provide a welcoming, safe environment for all attendees, we expressly forbid sexual images and symbols associated with historical atrocities and current hate groups from public* spaces at the convention. The following outlines the allowed exclusions:

Sexualized imagery or discussion related to sex, pornography, discriminatory language or similar is allowed if it meets all of the following criteria: (a) organizers have specifically granted permission in writing; (b) it is necessary to the topic of discussion and no alternative exists; (c) it is presented in a respectful manner, especially towards women and LGBTQIA people; and (d) attendees are warned in advance verbally or in the program and respectfully given ample warning and opportunity to leave beforehand. This exception does not allow use of gratuitous sexual images as attention-getting devices or unnecessary examples.

Hate based iconography is strictly forbidden from all public and convention* space. It includes (but is not limited to) iconography, paraphernalia, and cosplay representative of Nazi, neo-Nazi, KKK, and other hate groups. Anyone wearing or displaying an item of clothing, prop, or other item considered a hate symbol will be asked to remove it from the convention and refusal to do so will result in ejection from the convention without refund.

*A more detailed discussion of what constitutes "public" vs. "private" vs. "Convention" spaces can be found in the Phandemonium Policies and Procedures document.

II. How Phandemonium requests you report Instances of Disrespect

If you feel that you are being discriminated against, harassed, or if you notice someone behaving inappropriately (such as violating hotel, Phandemonium or convention policies), we respectfully suggest the following:

- 1. If you feel comfortable doing so, point out the inappropriate behavior to the person(s) involved. Often this will solve the problem immediately.
- 2. If you do not feel comfortable talking with the person(s) involved, or if talking to them does not resolve the issue, please report the situation as soon as you are able to any Phandemonium / Capricon event coordinator (i.e. Phandemonium Board Members, Convention Committee Members, Event Organizers, or Operations Staff). If the incident takes place during the Capricon Convention, these individuals can be identified by their Staff badge or "Staff" ribbon attached to their badge.
- 3. A report can be filed electronically by emailing **conduct@phandemonium.org** at any time. This email is directed to the Board President, Convention Chair, and Supreme Minister of Fun.

It would be extremely helpful if you could provide a name, badge name/number and/or physical description of the person(s) involved.

III. Corporate Response to Violations of The Code of Conduct

- 1. Phandemonium reserves the right to revoke without refund the membership of anyone for just cause, and eject anyone at any time from a Phandemonium event.
- 2. Failure to adhere to any of the above policies may result in a number of possible consequences. Consequences include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Talking with all parties involved and attempting to mediate a solution to the problem
 - Issuing verbal warnings
 - Revoking memberships and requesting that the person(s) leave the event
 - Involving hotel or facility staff or security
 - Contacting local law enforcement
 - Banning of attendance and membership to future Phandemonium events

Phandemonium Code of Conduct

IV. Privacy, Photographs, and Recording Electronic Information

Phandemonium event attendees should be aware that photography and video and/or audio recordings are frequently made by Phandemonium during events and that their likenesses may appear in those recordings. Attendees agree to assign without compensation the use of their likeness for the use of promotional material.

<u>Personal Photography / Recordings</u>: Please be polite and ask before taking photographs or recordings of attendees whenever possible. Video and audio recording and photography for personal archival use only is generally acceptable, unless individuals make it clear that they do not wish to be photographed or recorded (e.g.: a verbal request or via the official Capricon "No Photo" ribbon), in which case any photography or recording of them is expressly forbidden.

V. Media Relations

Phandemonium welcomes members of the press at its events. All journalists, media photographers, bloggers, podcasters and any other members of the press are required to display an official Press ribbon or be accompanied by a Phandemonium / Capricon staff member at all times while at Phandemonium events. Members of the press who have not been issued a Press ribbon may not conduct interviews or take photographs, audio or video footage without an escort.

VI. Financial Transactions

Checks that are presented against insufficient funds will be charged a fee of \$30 per check. Anyone who has an outstanding balance due to Phandemonium must settle that balance before being permitted to attend the Capricon Convention or an outreach event.

Capricon 44 Code of Conduct

In addition to the General Phandemonium Code of Conduct, Capricon members are expected to abide by the following Code of Conduct upon purchase of membership. It applies in all publicly accessible spaces at the facility and convention function areas.

Capricon reserves the right to revoke, without refund, the membership of anyone for just cause. This may also lead to being banned from future Capricon conventions. Persons violating the law may be turned over to the police or the hotel security.

All Phandemonium / Capricon events may have additional policies that members / attendees are required to follow. Any additional policies for events will be posted on the official Capricon website and social media.

Please also read over Capricon 44's COVID Policy before purchasing your badge.

Badges:


Capricon is a membership-only event, hosted by Phandemonium. All members must wear their badge at all times.

A badge is: 1) valid only for the person to whom it was issued, 2) only valid for the year of issue and may not be reused in a following year, 3) may not be shared under any circumstances.

Capricon requires that any child 12 or older have a purchased membership (or appropriate day badge) for the convention.

Age Restrictions:

All convention areas are open to members of all ages, with the exception of events or exhibits that are specifically noted to be inappropriate for minors and access to which is controlled.





Capricon 44 Code of Conduct

Hotel:

Please follow any and all rules set by the convention hotel. Phandemonium asks that you pay special attention to the following:

Damages: Any act of vandalism, deliberate or excessive damage to hotel property, or interference with hotel staff in the performance of their duties will have negative consequences for individuals and the convention. Consequences for individuals could range from being billed for damages, evicted from the hotel and/or convention, and criminal charges. These types of incidents can also harm the relationship Phandemonium has with the hotel, resulting in monetary losses or cancellation of our contract. The person in whose name a sleeping room is rented is solely responsible for the conduct of all individuals in the room as well as for the condition of the room. Excessive trash, soiling or other damage to hotel property, or any circumstance that may present a hazard to hotel housekeeping staff will also result in negative consequences as noted above.

Smoking: Illinois has an indoor clean air ordinance; this is beyond the control of Phandemonium and the hotel. Smoking or vaping is not allowed in any public buildings, including restaurants and bars, nor within 15 feet of building entrances. Designated smoking locations can be found outside the entrances to the hotel. The hotel does not allow smoking or vaping in sleeping rooms. NOTE: members who smoke or vape in sleeping rooms are subject to cleaning charges.

Pets: The hotel does not allow pets in function space. This is for the protection of the pet, the pet owner, our members, and hotel guests. Service animals are permitted in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Shoes: Shoes are to be worn in all public and convention spaces at the facility. Socks are NOT shoes.

Signs: Signs may be posted only in designated areas. Any signs posted in designated areas must be affixed using "blue painter's tape" ONLY. Do not affix anything to the walls of the hotel, to the elevators, to the windows, or to/over official Capricon signage. Blue painter's tape is available in limited quantities in Convention Operations.

Non-convention guests/General Public: The hotel is not dedicated completely to our use for the weekend. Members of the general public stay here or visit the hotel to dine and socialize. Please be considerate of non-convention individuals at all times. This includes hotel staff.

Weapons:

No actual weapon or any item that can be mistaken for one may be carried either openly or concealed at any time on properties being used for Capricon, regardless of any government permits which you may possess, unless it has been peace bonded by Operations. If you wish to carry such a weapon, it must be presented to Operations. Operations staff is the final arbiter of what weapons require peace bonding. If you are unsure about whether your weapon may be considered realistic, Operations staff will be happy to check it for you.

Any actual weapon or any item that can be mistaken for one that is purchased in the dealer room must be wrapped and immediately transported to your room or vehicle. If you wish to use the item at the convention, please refer to section 1 of this policy.

[In the event that Capricon sponsors a masquerade] If an actual weapon or any item that can be mistaken for one is part of your masquerade costume, you must transport it to and from the masquerade green room wrapped securely unless peace bonded. The masquerade director must approve your use of any weapons during the masquerade.

Live steel is prohibited. The Operations Department is the final arbiter of what constitutes live steel.

Any weapon, actual, realistic, or toy/prop, that is utilized in a threatening or harmful manner may result in confiscation of the item and/or removal of your membership without refund.

Failure to adhere to any of the above policies is grounds for removal of your membership without refund.

We are a private and voluntary membership-based organization. As a condition of membership, no member shall carry concealed firearms at our event. Any open carry is subject to the above noted weapons policies.

Capricon 44 Code of Conduct

Parties:

Only certain convention hotel rooms are available for hospitality suites, and all hospitality events / parties must be coordinated with the Capricon Party Liaison and occur in these designated spaces.

Party floors are crowded; we encourage you to leave your props in your room or vehicle.

All hospitality events / parties must follow the Phandemonium and Capricon Codes of Conduct. Hospitality / party rooms are considered private space and as such, the individual host may have additional rules beyond those mentioned herein.

Alcohol:

The legal drinking age in Illinois is 21. Hosts of registered hospitality events are required to verify legal drinking age (by checking unexpired proper government issued identification) of anyone who wishes to drink alcohol at their event. Capricon does not allow alcohol consumption in convention function space. Please follow hotel policies on alcohol consumption/transportation in hotel spaces, such as the lobby.

Privacy, Photographs, and Recording Electronic Information:

Capricon supports intellectual property rights. The usage of photographic or recording devices is prohibited within certain areas of the convention, including the Film Room, Anime Room, Art Show, and Art Auction. Where allowed, we suggest that personal photographs be taken before or after a program event to avoid distracting panelists and audience members from the discussion.

If you do not wish to be photographed, please go to either Operations or the Info Desk and request a "No Photo" ribbon. If you affix a "no photo" ribbon to the side of your badge, the official con photographer and the social media chair will make a reasonable effort to honor your wishes. The con photographer and the social media chair can be recognized by their "Official Photographer" ribbon. You may still decline to be photographed if asked, even without a ribbon.

<u>Sales of Merchandise:</u>

All vending (exchange of money for goods or services) must be authorized by the convention, and only take place in authorized locations. Vendors must comply with all applicable laws (including but not limited to copyright and tax laws).

Reporting:

If you are being harassed by a member of Capricon 44, notice that someone else is being harassed, or have any other concerns, please either contact the Code of Conduct Team by going to Convention Operations or by filing a report electronically by emailing *conduct@phandemonium.org* at any time. This email is directed to the Board President, Convention Chair, and Supreme Minister of Fun.

If the person who is harassing you is on the team, they will recuse themselves from handling your incident. We will respond as promptly as we can.

Consequences:

Participants asked to stop any harassing behavior are expected to comply immediately.

If a participant engages in harassing behavior, the Code of Conduct Team may take any action they deem appropriate, up to and including expulsion from all Capricon 44 spaces and other actions as seen fit by the Board of Directors.



Frustrated but undeterred, she kept up her interest until, at age 17, she fulfilled a high school senior internship requirement by apprenticing to Mickie Caspi, a renowned calligrapher and artist who specializes in Jewish marriage documents (*ketubot*). After graduating, she was invited back as a summer employee for two years, and then went freelance.

After college, while taking commissions for ketubot, which are usually lavishly decorated and hung on the wall of a marital home, Ariela received two requests for Star Trek art,





two for Star Wars, one for steampunk, and one for zombies in the space of 18 months. Realizing that there was an under-served niche market lurking here, Ariela enlisted the help of her best friend, Terri Ash.

Terri spent a number of years working in a Judaica store where she handled nearly all the orders for *ketubot*. Many of the orders were for *ketubot* by Mickie, which meant that Terri spoke to Mickie's business partner and husband, Eran. Terri combined her experience with the wholesale and retail markets for *ketubot* with her knowledge of the Caspi's business model to become the business manager of Geek Calligraphy.


Geek Calligraphy was launched in early 2016. From January to May 2016, Ariela put out a new product every other week; by May, Terri had convinced her that this was, in fact, a bananapants production schedule for someone with a full-time day job, and reined her in to a more sustainable pace.



As it says on the tin, Geek Calligraphy specializes in calligraphy and art with a geeky bent, spanning a range from tech nerdery to licensed art for speculative fiction novels to Judaica. Some of the their best beloved pieces are the "Coder's Oath," inspired by Ariela's former day job where she was not a programmer but "played one on TV"; the "Lady Astronaut Nouveau," based on *The Calculating Stars* by Mary Robinette Kowal; and "A Wonderous Woman," a calligram which shapes the words of Proverbs 31, most famously "A valorous woman, who can find her?" into the Wonder Woman logo.

Ariela and Terri are also enthusiastic supporters of and advocates for artists' rights to fair compensation for their work. Though Ariela spends less time yelling about it on the internet, both Ariela and Terri are dedicated to encouraging both their current colleagues and newer artists to charge what their time and skills are worth.





Geek Calligraphy has two branch locations, one in Ariela's studio in Skokie, IL, and one in Terri's home in Seattle, WA.

In 2021, Ariela ran as far away as possible from her day job in nonprofit technology, becoming a full time Torah scribe who spends all day writing with a quill on parchment. She finds the lack of constant system updates to her work operating system restful.

Her middle grade novel, Ruby Finley vs. the Interstellar Invasion, won the 2022 Andre Norton Nebula Award and is nominated for an IGNYTE Award.

Tempest's short fiction has appeared in several anthologies and magazines, including New Suns 2: Original Speculative Fiction by People of Color, Black Sci-Fi Short Stories, Sunspot Jungle, Diverse Energies, Federations, Strange Horizons, Electric Velocipede, EscapePod, and PodCastle, plus many more. Her debut novel is about Ruby—a young, Black genius who loves entomology—her encounter with the weirdest bug she's



ever seen, and the mysterious men in black suits who come looking for it.

Tempest organizes and teaches classes and seminars on writing inclusive, diverse fiction for <u>Writing the Other.com</u>. She's also given talks, seminars, and workshops on these and other creative writing topics for Clarion West, Sarah Lawrence College, LitReactor, Sisters in Crime, the Sirens Conference, Willamette Writers Conference, the Writing Excuses Conference and Retreat, several local RWA chapters, and other writing groups, conferences, colleges, and entertainment companies.

In 2020 Tempest, alongside Nisi Shawl and Cynthia Ward, won the *LOCUS* Magazine Special Award for Inclusivity and Representation Education for their work with Writing the Other. Tempest, Nisi, and Writing the Other were also nominated in 2020 and 2021 for the IGNYTE Community Award.

Tempest enjoys commenting on media as much as consuming it and won't hesitate to harsh your squee about that TV show, movie, book, or other piece of entertainment that doesn't live up to high standards. Her articles, media criticism, and reviews can be found on NPR, LitReactor, the SFWA blog, io9, and various other media outlets. Her essays have appeared in collections (*Chicks Dig Time Lords, Luminescent Threads: Connections to Octavia E. Butler*, and more) and college textbooks (*Call And Response: Key Debates in African American Studies*, and *Current Issues and Enduring Questions* 12th ed.).

When not writing or teaching, she hosts and contributes to multiple podcasts, including ORIGINality, Writing Excuses, the JEMcast, and The Write Gear.

She's active in the SFF community and volunteers for a number of non-profit organizations. In the past she's served as a juror for the James Tiptree Jr. (now Otherwise) Award, served as Programming co-chair for the WisCon feminist science fiction convention, organized fundraising auctions and salons for the Interstitial Arts Foundation, and raised funds for Clarion West, her writing workshop alma mater.

Currently, she serves on the board of the Carl Brandon Society, an organization dedicated to increasing racial and ethnic diversity in the production of and audience for speculative fiction.

Tempest has often been been recognized for her activism and community engagement. Most recently in 2023 she and the other members of the Carl Brandon Society leadership team won a *LOCUS* Magazine Special Award for Developing Diversity in Genre Communities. The organization is also a 2023 nominee for the IGNYTE Awards Community Award for Outstanding Efforts in Service of Inclusion and Equitable Practice in Genre. In 2022 she was honored with the Lemonade Award for acts of kindness which further science fiction community. In 2021 she was nominated for the IGNYTE Ember Award for unsung contributions to the genre.

Victor Raymond - Fan Guest of Honor

"Living In The Future" A short memoir by Victor Raymond © 2023

So who am I? Here's the short form:

"Victor Raymond is a biracial, bisexual, Native American from the Twin Cities. He has been a science fiction convention chair or executive committee member, twice for Minicon and twice for WisCon. He has been a convention Fan Guest three times in the past: Keycon 12 in Winnipeg, MB in 1995, Arisia in 2005, and Convergence in 2018. In addition, Victor is a former President of the Minnesota Science Fiction Society (MinnStF), an Organizing Editor for Stipple-APA, a founding steering committee member of the Carl Brandon Society (carlbrandon.org) and a former board member of the Interstitial Arts Foundation.



"Outside of fandom, Victor has been a community organizer, a tenants'

rights advocate, a National Co-coordinator of BiNet USA, a co-founder of the Bisexual Empowerment Conference, and a three time invited guest to White House events during the Obama Administration. He has also served as a board member of the Minnesota American Indian AIDS Task Force (now the Indigenous Peoples' Task Force). He holds a PhD in Sociology from Iowa State University, with a graduate minor in Women's Studies."

But that doesn't really tell you very much. Let me explain this another way.

When I was a child, I discovered science fiction. This was in the late 60s, maybe 1970. I was in elementary school, and my best friend's dad had loaned me his Scribner's hardcover copy of *Space Cadet* by Robert A. Heinlein. — I was *entranced*.

Reading about Matt Dodson was exciting - what SF fans in the past described as a sense of wonder - I was exploring a whole new world, seeing places and people in strange and challenging circumstances. Looking back on Space Cadet now, it is fairly easy to see how it reflected the time it was written and the background of the author: the newly-discovered horrific nature of nuclear war; then-current ideas about Martian air being breathable, and Venus as a hot jungle planet; Heinlein's experiences as a U.S. Navy officer. As a work of science fiction, it is as dated as Jules Verne or H.G. Wells — but that doesn't mean it was not or is not relevant, even now.

I went on from there — I read Asimov, Clarke, Tolkien, C.L. Moore, Andre Norton, you name it. Some authors were then relatively new: C.J. Cherryh, Samuel R. Delany, Ursula K. Le Guin, and many others. I probably spent more years in the rest of the galaxy than on Planet Earth, but in the end, I always came back.

Victor Raymond - Fan Guest of Honor

As a teenager, I got involved in SF fandom, role-playing games, and the Society for Creative Anachronism. I also read books about history, current affairs, and social activism, particularly Saul Alinsky and his community organizing work in Chicago's Back of the Yards neighborhood in the 1930s. Putting it all together, I was aware that science fiction was both about the future and about social conditions in the here-and-now. That the choices we make *today* shape the world of *tomorrow*, and it was important to keep that in mind.

One of the books I read as a teenager had a profound effect on me: Diane Duane's *The Door Into Fire*. It was the first book I had read where it was considered perfectly normal to be bisexual — where sexuality wasn't a matter of social judgment and potential discrimination. I also found that science fiction fandom was a place where being different was pretty much expected, and since I was bisexual, I encountered very little homophobia or biphobia.

Fast forward a bit: after I graduated from college, I stayed involved in science fiction fandom. I got involved in the convention committee for Minicon, held every year on Easter weekend in the Twin Cities — I eventually became one of the hotel liaisons for the convention, then was on the Executive Committee for Minicon 28 and 33. At that same time, I also became the vice-chair and later the chair of the Board of Directors of the St. Paul Tenants Union. I have to say, my experiences helping run fannish organizations were *highly* beneficial in helping to run more mundane institutions.

Because of the science fiction and fantasy I had read, I knew about the theme of "if this goes on" — if society became really unequal, what would that look like? So when I testified in front of city councils or the state legislature, I had some inspiration for fighting injustice. I also became part of the Speakers Bureau for the Gay and Lesbian Community Action Council of Minnesota (now Outfront Minnesota), and learned to tell my own story as a biracial and bisexual person. When Minnesotans were fighting for LGBTQIA+ equality in the 1990s, I became the co-chair of the People of Color Caucus of It's Time, Minnesota. We won that fight in 1992.

Fast forward again: a few years before starting graduate school in 1999, I became more involved in helping to run WisCon, the world's foremost feminist science fiction convention. In 1999, I worked with Nalo Hopkinson, Ian Hagemann, Mary Anne Mohanraj, Cecilia Tan, Nisi Shawl and others to form the Carl Brandon Society, "to help the world understand that we can't create a just future if people of color aren't included in its imagining." We could not have done that without all of us meeting at WisCon, and we have all gone on in our own work to make the world a better place.


Since that time, I have chaired WisCon twice, and became re-involved in LGBTQIA+ activism on a national level. I was an invited guest to the Obama White House to celebrate Pride Month in June 2014. When I stepped into the main hallway and looked around, I was somewhat lost in the sea of faces of LGBTQIA+ activists from all over the country. The *only* person I recognized was Rose Hayes, an amazing trans woman who has served on the Board of Directors of the National LGBTQ Task Force. How did I know her? We met at WisCon, and became friends there. More importantly, *we worked together* on WisCon.

Victor Raymond - Fan Guest of Honor

What I am trying to say is that science fiction and its fandom have played a pivotal role in my life. It has shown me what the future might hold, and helped me to better understand the present. More importantly, because of the work I have done with other science fiction fans, I have had an advantage in my work in the "mundane" part of my life. Works including N.K. Jemisin's Inheritance Trilogy, or Charlie Jane Anders' *All the Birds in the Sky*, or John M. Ford's *Aspects* have all deepened my understanding of everyday life, and how important it is to be engaged in the immediate realities of the environment, politics, and social issues that we all confront, individually and together.

A lot of times, science fiction is denigrated as "escapism" - that somehow, sf readers are somehow incapable of dealing with the real world. I think that is entirely off the mark. In reality, by imagining something completely different, science fiction helps us think about the here-and-now, the real world. If we are going to imagine better futures, we have to work on making a better present. With the help of science fiction, we can do that. More importantly, if I can do that, so can you.

Will you get involved in making the world a better place? Can we do this together? I hope so.

Marinda was devoted to the endurance of Capricon, having worn many hats for the convention and Phandemonium over the years. She served in multiple volunteer roles, including Con Chair in 2016, and remained with the convention until the end. At the conclusion of her battle with cancer, she was serving as the Information Technology department head. Ever the pragmatist, she created a succession plan to ensure the department and convention would endure.

In Memoriam: Bob Granstaff



The art show is a place where you can enjoy a wide variety of work from many talented artists. You can find almost anything in the art show, from traditional paintings to photography, digital art, jewelry, fiber arts, calligraphy, mixed media, and more. Exhibitors here range from established professionals to up-and-coming amateurs, and we even have space for artists to do demonstrations and talk about their work. Everything culminates in the Artist Showdown and the Live Art Auction on Saturday night, so be sure to stop by before it's too late!

Bidding at the Show

The Art Show is divided into two sections: the **Auction Gallery** and the **Print Shop**. The **Auction Gallery** is run primarily as a written auction. Bid sheets will be adjacent to the piece, and you may bid by writing your name, badge number, & bid amount on the sheet. The first bid on a piece must be at or above the minimum bid; subsequent bids must be greater than the previous bid by at least \$1.00

If a piece in the Auction Gallery receives 3 (or more) qualifying bids, it will go to the Live Art Auction on Saturday night. If a piece receives fewer than 3 bids, the highest bid on that piece prior to close of the Art Show on Saturday will win.

Pieces in the **Print Shop** are available for immediate sale at set prices as marked.

Artists of all kinds can be found at the tables in front of the Art Show, demonstrating their skills and answering questions about their work. Check the schedule at the door to see what times your favorite artist might be in residence!

We accept payment via cash, check, or charge (Visa and MasterCard only, please). No art will be released without payment. You'll also need your badge with you to verify your bid and that you're a member of the con.

Art Show Awards

As usual, all art awards are decided by you, the attendees! Ballots and a ballot box will be available in the Art Show every day of the con until we close on Saturday. The awards – works of art in their own right - will be on display in the art show until they are awarded during the live auction on Saturday night.

Work in the art show (NFS pieces included, but Print Shop pieces excluded) may be eligible for the following awards:

Best in Show Best Pro Work Best Non-Pro Work (Previously "Best Fan Work") Best Challenge Entry

The **Best Challenge Entry** award goes to the artist voted to best fulfill the Artist's Challenge by creating work that incorporates a goat (the convention's mascot) and three of the following: a galaxy, a rocket ship, an astrological sign, or a celestial object.

Scheduled Game Descriptions

<u>Casting Shadows</u>: Board Game, 2-4 Players, Ages 12+, 60 minutes Explore a dark, enchanting world and battle your opponents in this turn-based competitive strategic board game.

Throughout the game, you'll collect resources, learn spells, summon a companion, and - if you're lucky - unlock your Shadow Form, all in the quest to become the ultimate Shadow Caster. The last player standing in this supernatural showdown wins the game!

<u>Traveller: "Losing Air"</u>: Role Playing Game (Classic Traveller), 3-6 players, Ages 15+, up to 3 hours

Thrown together by a pirate attack, you are aboard a lifeboat, far away from any inhabited planet. Can you work together to survive—especially when you are losing air?

This is an adventure for Classic Traveller RPG from Far Future Enterprises, in a non-3rd Imperium setting. No experience needed, all materials provided, beginners welcome!

<u>Dungeons & Dragons: "Doomground"</u>: Role Playing Game (Original D&D), 3-8 players, Ages 15+, up to 3 hours

Hundreds of years ago, Doomground was the site of the last cosmic battle between Law and Chaos. With the adherents of Chaos and their minions defeated, the land has been quiet since then - or maybe not!

It's the 50th Anniversary of the publication of *Dungeons & Dragons*, all the way back in 1974! No experience required, all materials will be provided, new players get priority. (This event is open to players and observers - think of it as an actual play experience.)

<u>Disney Villainous</u>: Board Game, 2 - 6 Players, Ages 10+, up to 2 hours
In this epic contest of sinister power, take on the role of a Disney villain and strive to achieve your own devious objective. Discover your character's unique abilities and winning strategy while dealing twists of fate to thwart your opponents' schemes. Find out who will triumph over the forces of good and win it all!

In *Villainous*, each player takes control of one of six Disney characters, each one a villain from a different Disney movie. Each player has their own villain deck, fate deck, player board, and 3D character.

On a turn, the active player moves their character to a different location on their player board, takes one or more of the actions visible on that space then refills their hand to four cards. Cards can be allies, items, effects, conditions, and even curses. Play your cards to fulfill your unique win condition.

Scheduled Game Descriptions

Flamecraft: Card Game, 1 - 5 Players, Ages 10+, up to 1 hour

Artisan dragons, the smaller and magically talented versions of their larger (and destructive) cousins, are sought by shopkeepers so that they may delight customers with their flamecraft. You are a Flamekeeper, skilled in the art of conversing with dragons, placing them in their ideal home and using enchantments to entice them to produce wondrous things. Your reputation will grow as you aid the dragons and shopkeepers, and the Flamekeeper with the most reputation will be known as the Master of Flamecraft.

In *Flamecraft*, players take on the role of Flamekeepers, gathering items, placing dragons and casting enchantments to enhance the shops of the town. Dragons are specialized (bread, meat, iron, crystal, plant and potion) and the Flamekeepers know which shops are the best home for each. Visit a shop to gain items and a favor from one of the dragons there. Gathered items can be used to enchant a shop, gaining reputation and the favors of all the dragons in the shop. If you are fortunate enough to attract fancy dragons then you will have opportunities to secure even more reputation.

Fluxx (with the Head of Gaming): Card Game, 2 - 6 Players, Ages 8+, up to 30 minutes

The Head of Gaming, more commonly known as Hoptavia, can be elusive and hard to find when she isn't in the Game Room. So she's decided to give everyone a chance to complete that task for the Scavenger Hunt by assigning herself to a table and playing some *Fluxx* with whomever wants to join her. She will have a variety of different types of *Fluxx* to play and might even have some promo cards available if you manage to beat her (while supplies last.)

Formula D: Racing Dice Game, 2 - 10 Players, Ages 8+, 60 minutes

Formula D is a high stakes Formula One type racing game where the players race simulated cars with the hope of crossing the finish line first. The game mechanisms are a simple race - get to the finish line first! However, players have to use a significant amount of planning, and rely on quite a bit of luck. Each player manages when to shift gears, with each gear providing a different speed. Each turn, players may move up one gear, stay in that gear, or move down gears. This forces players to match possible rolls with the optimum distance for that turn, and hopefully plan ahead. However, speed is not the only issue! Corners have a "stop" rule that requires players to stop once, twice, or three times on that corner in consecutive turns or face a penalty. This creates an effective speed limit to the corners.

Of course, things do not always go as planned! Players take penalties (decreases to the car's attributes) if they miss their roll, bump into another car, are blocked by other cars, have to brake heavily, or have to downshift several gears. Too many penalties will result in elimination, or a severe setback for that car. You'll need to manage your car's health, plan the best path, and have luck with the dice if you want to win the race!

Scheduled Game Descriptions

<u>Pandemic</u>: Co-Op Board Game, 1 - 4 Players, Ages 8+, up to 60 minutes
In Pandemic, several virulent diseases have broken out simultaneously all over the
world! The players are disease-fighting specialists whose mission is to treat disease
hotspots while researching cures for each of four plagues before they get out of hand.

Taking a unique role within the team, players must plan their strategy to mesh with their specialists' strengths in order to conquer the diseases. For example, the Operations Expert can build research stations which are needed to find cures for the diseases and which allow for greater mobility between cities; the Scientist needs only four cards of a particular disease to cure it instead of the normal five—but the diseases spread quickly and time is running out. If one or more diseases spreads too fast or if too much time elapses, the players all lose. If they cure the four diseases, they all win!

Terraforming Mars: Board Game, 1 - 5 Players, Ages 12+, 2 hours

In the 2400s, mankind begins to terraform the planet Mars. Giant corporations initiate huge projects to raise the temperature, oxygen level, and ocean coverage until the environment is habitable. In *Terraforming Mars*, you play one of those corporations and work together in the terraforming process, but compete for victory points that are awarded not only for your contribution to the terraforming, but also for advancing human infrastructure throughout the solar system.

Wingspan: Card Game, 1 - 5 Players, Ages 10+, 45 - 60 minutes

You are bird enthusiasts—researchers, bird watchers, ornithologists, and collectors—seeking to discover and attract the best birds to your network of wildlife preserves. Each bird extends a chain of powerful combinations in one of your habitats. Wingspan is a competitive, medium-weight, card-driven, engine-building board game with over 170 birds illustrated by Beth Sobel, Natalia Rojas, and Ana Maria Martinez.

<u>Magic the Gathering - Casual Commander</u>: Card Game, Ages 13+ Join us for a totally casual get-together to play commander/edh! <u>No competitive decks allowed</u>, and there will be free booster giveaways for everyone who shows up, courtesy of Noble Knight Games.

There will be three tables dedicated to this 3 hour event. There is no limit to how many players can participate or limit to how long the games can be. Players may continue playing once the event officially ends but may be asked to move if the tables are needed for another event.

<u>Magic the Gathering - Learn to Play</u> : Card Game, Maximum of 6 Players, Ages 13+, up to 2 hours

In Magic the Gathering, you play the role of a planeswalker—a powerful wizard who fights other planeswalkers for glory, knowledge, and conquest. Your deck of cards represents all the weapons in your arsenal. It contains the spells you know and the creatures you can summon to fight for you.

Curious? Want to know more about the grandfather of collectible card games (CCG)? Always wanted to play but didn't know where or how to start? Join Sam, our Convention Chair, as she explains everything there is to know to get started playing MtG and teaches you how to play your very first game.






